Principal's Report

Week 2 Term 3 2021 Issue 11

It is hard to believe how last week unfolded. From the 'high' of welcoming students back to school after the holidays, and then slumping into our fifth lockdown. It is understandable that there is increasing lockdown fatigue amongst our community.

We entered lockdown differently on this occasion. The lockdown announcement came after school had closed on Thursday (The grapevine Thursday morning was indicating that the verdict on a lockdown was 'not yet'. This changed so incredibly quickly Thursday afternoon.) It impeded our ability to immediately implement a remote learning model based upon digital connectivity at home, which is what we have operated in the past.

Remote Learning

The biggest hurdle we face that impedes implementation and a seamless roll into Digital Remote Learning, is the number of devices we need to loan/supply to families so they can access a digital learning program (over 100 devices). While always very happy to support families in this way, it takes time to coordinate and creates additional community contact when device collection is facilitated.

On this occasion (Lockdown 5) we had many community members classified as close contacts to positive COVID cases, with students, parents and some teachers caught up in Tier 1 exposure sites. We are so very lucky that at this stage, we still have not had a positive case in our community. The increased potential exposure meant there was a pressing need to pause until negative COVID test results were received, before inviting nearly 100 students (and their parents/carers) to come and collect a device. I have previously explained why Digital Remote Learning is our preferred method of learning delivery, and I believe that this level of online support was certainly missed by us all while we reverted to a paper based option last Friday, Monday and Tuesday.

Upon learning that the lockdown was to be extended, and with all COVID tests returning Negative results, we were able to provide a drive through collection system on Tuesday in an attempt to get a device to everyone who needed one. Needless to say, implementation of Digital Remote Learning was warmly welcomed on Wednesday.

COMPASS

With decisions being made constantly, I want to sincerely thank you all for monitoring and reading the COMPASS notices as they come through. I recognise that it is a fine line between being kept informed and information overload, and I do hope that we have found a supportive balance for families.

I do hope that this lockdown passes quickly, and that you and your families remain safe throughout. We eagerly await the return to face-to-face learning where we can once again have your children back at school.

Annual Parent Opinion Survey

There have been many occasions where we have utilised surveys to gather information from our parent/carer community to assist in school development and the work that we do here at school.

It is a fine balance between seeking your opinion and peppering you all with constant requests for surveys to be completed. It is with this in mind that I respectfully draw your attention to two surveys that would assist us greatly at the moment.

1. We have created a Languages Working Party consisting of parents, students, teachers and school leadership that is exploring the effective provision of learning about a language other than English. We would benefit so deeply from the support of the parent, student and staff communities to complete a cohort specific survey so that we can be as informed as possible when designing a program to support learners at Hughesdale Primary School.

engagement and experiences of remote and flexible learning. We utilise these survey results to help inform and direct future school planning and improvement strategies. It provides valuable comparative data where we can compare our results with the results at other schools across Victoria.

All responses to the survey are anonymous. This year, the Parent/Caregiver/Guardian Opinion Survey will be conducted from Thursday 5th August to Sunday 22nd August. It is conducted online, only takes 20 minutes to complete, and can be accessed at any convenient time within the fieldwork period on desktop computers, laptops, tablets or smartphones. The online survey will be available in a range of languages other than English. These include: Arabic, Vietnamese, Mandarin, Chin (Hakha), Hindi, Japanese, Somali, Turkish, Punjabi and Greek.

As this Newsletter will be available to the general public (on our website), log-in details are being circulated to families enrolled at Hughesdale Primary School on Thursday 5th August through a COMPASS note. I thank you for taking the time to provide us with your responses.

Assistant Principal's Report

Curriculum and Pedagogy

Curriculum Day Term 3

On Monday 12th July we had our third Curriculum Day for the year. We are grateful to all of our families for making care arrangements on this pupil free day. Curriculum Days are so valuable for the staff to be able to engage in uninterrupted professional development together and are one way we enact the school philosophy of being a community of lifelong learners. Staff all returned from the July break fresh and enthusiastic and made the most of this time.

In Term two Lisa Gough, Amanda Breeden-Walton, Rachael Strauch and myself participated in a five - part Embedding Formative Assessment course with Dylan Wiliam online (Dylan is a British educationalist and Emeritus professor of Educational Assessment at the UCL Institute of Education) and we shared learning from this on our Curriculum Day. We explored research around learning memory and in particular memory storage strength and retrieval strength. We took away from this the importance of building our students' retrieval strength, interspersing retrieval of taught information over time.

We also reviewed the whole school agreed pedagogical approaches (Ways we teach) used at Hughesdale Primary, a map of which you can see here.

- Collaborative learning
- Multiple exposures
- Questioning
- Feedback
- Metacognitive strategies and
- Differentiated teaching

This information was then used by teachers to map out their own learning plans, acknowledging their strengths and areas for development. As we meet students at their point of need in learning, so to do we need to meet teachers at their points of need. Teachers develop and refine their craft in the classroom, in team discussions, through engagement with professional reading/viewing and by visiting each other's classrooms in our collegiate visits program.

Further to this we reviewed the Victorian Institute of Teachings Code of Conduct and Ethics, which was updated in May, and viewed whole school data sets.

The team of teachers participating in the Bastow LDAP course this year (Literacy Data Assessment Practices - there are lots of acronyms in teaching!) gave the staff an update, a big part of their learning being an applied project which is enabling a comprehensive review and



This topic linked well to all of the learning students had completed around Natural Disasters (our Cross Curricular topic for Term 2). This is why we believe floods are more dangerous than bushfires. I will now let the




